












Tourism/Events

 - Paid by drug fund at no cost to taxpayers.

Splash Pad Improvements - Replaced Operation Controller, VFD Drive, Motor and Float.
Piney River Boat Ramp: Installation of Approximately 210' X 4' Black Chain Link, (X2) Cantilever Gates.
Dixie Youth Boat Ramp / Trailhead: spread leveled and packed 22.36 tons of gravel.

Water:

- Annual Water Meter Audit; Total water meters audited = 1,219
- Replaced / Installed 80' feet of 12" PVC Water Main and (X1) Air Pressure Relief Valve in Nature Park
 - This updated our water system to help improve water quality and frequent repairs.
- Installed Water Booster Pump on Price Road to comply with the State of Tennessee Minimum 20 psi Standard Regulation.
- New services = 4
- Water Main Repairs = 14

Sewer:

- Bought 70 grinder pumps with leftover CDBG grant funds totaling \$19,845.38
- New services = 4
- Sewer Main Repairs = 3
- Grinder Pumps Replaced = 23
- Jetted Approximately 1475' of Sewer Main
- Monthly Manhole Inspections: Total inspected = 1476,
- Annual Manhole Inspection: Total inspected = 249
- Annual Grinder pump audit; Total Grinder pumps Audited = 193



SPRING

PUBLIC WORKS DEPAR



- 112,191,000 total gallons produced for 2024
 - 12% decrease from 2023
 - 19,594,700 North Rhea Utility District (-27% from prior year)
- Water loss for the year averaged 30%
- Cleaned both sedimentation basins in the spring and fall.
- Pressure washed all sidewalks and clear well,
- Painted the overflow pipe on the Back Valley Tank and installed new duck bill.
- Pulled all required samples for the state compliance schedule.
- Had both tanks externally inspected.
- Had repairs done to the roof of the Hillcrest tank.







- Purchased and installed new chlorine analyzer.
- Purchased and installed new turbidimeter analyzer.
- Had variable frequency drive installed at the Piccadilly Pump Station.
- Scored a 99 on the annual Sanitary Survey of Community Water System Inspection.
- Spent 5 months out the year conducting the service line inventory that was required nationwide by the EPA. During this inventory every meter in the city was checked for potential lead service lines. Letters were mailed to the customere with service lines that could not be determined upon inspection. We are currently working on these unknown lines and will continue to update the service line inventory list once each of the lines are identified.



• Stats

- Overall, the wastewater plant operated normally
- 54 inches of rainfall fell during 2024 (down by 4 inches from 2023)
- We had only 1 overflows Twin View Drive
- We had zero bypasses at the plant this year.
- 237,000,000 total gallons of treated wastewater passed through the plant
 - Down 5,000,000 from 2023
